
KCKCC Art Gallery Prepares for Art Show Focusing on Women's Rights

The Kansas City Kansas Community College Art Gallery opened its first show of the fall 2020 semester, "Audacity: The March to Women's Rights." The pieces, both art and poetry, showcased in "Audacity: The March to Women's Rights" were inspired by the work of local Kansas City artist, Gloria Heifner. Heifner shared portraits and stories of 10 American women, from Sojourner Truth to Gloria Steinem and Ruth Bader Ginsburg, who had the audacity to stand up for women's rights. These women changed history because of their willingness to stand up and make a difference through incredibly difficult odds on such issues as slavery, the proposed equal rights amendment and the 19th amendment to the U.S. Constitution. Curated by Polly Alice McCann, the show was hosted by the KCKCC Art Gallery in partnership with Flying Ketchup Press. The show also included work by Kansas author and photographer, Sharon Rodriguez and four national poets - Joan Gerstein, Candice Kelsey, Catharine Phillips and Linda Neal Reising.


KCKCC Hosts m-pact Virtual Vocal Festival

KCKCC Library Joins MOBIUS Consortium

The Kansas City Kansas Community College Library joined the KC-Towers cluster of the MOBIUS consortium. This cluster contains 15 college and public libraries, many located in the Kansas City metropolitan area. More than 62 million items are available in the MOBIUS Union catalog that can be requested in print or digital formats, and items borrowed from member libraries will be delivered within days instead of weeks. In addition, KCKCC will now have access to the Open Education Network.

KCKCC's Accreditation Status Changed by Higher Learning Commission

The Higher Learning Commission (HLC) changed Kansas City Kansas Community College's accreditation status from "Accredited" to "Accredited-Probation" on November 5, 2020. The action was taken as, similar to other institutions across the country, the Commission determined KCKCC was out of compliance in two of the 21 Components in the Criteria for Accreditation. Prior to the HLC visit, KCKCC self-recognized opportunities for improvement in assessment and program review. The HLC confirmed the College's findings, and prior to the visit KCKCC had already begun implementing significant changes in processes to strengthen these areas. The HLC revisits KCKCC in March 2022 to review evidence of systemic changes made in these areas that will continue KCKCC's efforts to advance excellence across the institution. The College is confident of successful outcomes from the spring 2022 visit.

New Artwork Featured at KCKCC

KCKCC installed new artwork on the main campus. These beautiful art installations are on the old KCKCC signs at the Parallel Parkway entrance to campus and are part of the college's Ambient Learning Campus Beautification project. The art going eastbound is of a group of musicians, while the art going westbound is of a pair of soccer players.

KCKCC Continues to Install Artwork from Rita Blitt Donation

More than 100 paintings donated by Kansas City-based artist Rita Blitt continued to be installed at KCKCC locations throughout the 2020-21 academic year. The donation was made in an effort to help bring museum quality artwork to those who may not otherwise have the opportunity to see it. Blitt's works have been featured in more than 70 solo exhibitions and showcased in many museums and private collections including the Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art, Kemper Museum of Contemporary Art, the John F. Kennedy Library, the National Museum of Singapore and the Kennedy Museum of American Art, among others.

KCKCC Celebrated 96th-Annual Candle Lighting Ceremony

While Kansas City Kansas Community College's oldest tradition looked different, the 96th-annual Candle Lighting Ceremony continued as a virtual event December 16 to herald in the holiday season. The theme was "Celebrating Our Heritage," and included performances from students and faculty in both the KCKCC Music and Theatre departments as well as a presentation from the KCKCC Intercultural Center. Among the performances were those from the KCKCC Jazz Band, Funk Band, Fusion Jazz Vocal Ensemble, The Standard Vocal Jazz Ensemble and the KCKCC Theatre/Drama Club. In addition, programs from KCKCC's Dr. Thomas R. Burke Technical Education Center and the KCKCC Pioneer Career Center in Leavenworth were highlighted.

KCKCC Programs Receive Full Accreditation

Three KCKCC programs were notified that they have received continuing accreditation. The Associate Degree Nursing/Registered Nursing program received unconditional accreditation from the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing. The program is fully accredited until its next accreditation cycle. In addition, the Respiratory Therapy program received continuing accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation for Respiratory Care. The program met or exceeded all thresholds for success and is fully accredited until its next accreditation cycle.

KCKCC Recognized by the Black Achievers Society of Greater Kansas City

KCKCC's Risala Allen and John Stafford were recognized as 2021 Black Achievers in Business and Industry Award recipients by the Black Achievers Society of Greater Kansas City. KCKCC was also recognized as one of the event's sponsors.

KCKCC Celebrates Student Housing Groundbreaking

KCKCC celebrated the groundbreaking of its new, 260-bed Student Housing facility February 19. Scheduled to be completed in summer 2022, the four-story facility will include 57 four bed units; seven two bed units; five ADA Mobility units, two three bed units and one each for the housing specialist and housing supervisor. In addition, other planned amenities include a group study hall, hammock park, study spaces, a 250 person outdoor amphitheater, a community laundry facility, a FEMA rated storm shelter, a 3,000 square foot gaming room and an outdoor patio/grilling area.

KCKCC Foundation Recognizes 2021 Hall of Fame **Honorees in Virtual Event**

The Kansas City Kansas Community College Foundation recognized its 2021 class of inductees during the virtual hall of fame event April 23. The KCKCC Foundation's Hall of Fame, formerly the Mid America Education Hall of Fame, started in 1996 to recognize individuals, organizations and corporate supporters in the community who have made notable contributions to education. Hall of Fame inductees are selected based on a demonstrated commitment to education, their effort to improve the quality of life in the community through a commitment to education, increasing educational opportunities for others and supporting significant changes that have improved the quality of education. Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, individuals and organizations selected as 2020 honorees were honored with the 2021 inductees. Inductees included Alan Hoskins, the Leavenworth Public Schools Education Foundation, Maxine Drew, Mary Ann Flunder and Pamela M. Louis-Walden.

Kansas Lt. Governor Visits Proposed **Downtown Community Ed Center Site**

KCKCC President Dr. Greg Mosier and Vice President of Strategic Initiatives Dr. Tami Bartunek met with Kansas Lt. Governor David Toland April 26 at the site of the proposed Community Education Center project in downtown Kansas City, Kansas. In addition, representatives from the The University of Kansas, Wyandot Behavioral Health and YMCA of Greater Kansas City were present to talk about their roles in the project. KCKCC plans to build the 119,000 square-foot center to serve as an anchor institution for KCK, providing social and economic mobility for its residents and be a national model for future educational institutions across the country.




Lansing Correctional **Facility Celebrates Career-Campus Ribbon Cutting**



KCKCC Music Student Receives Ella Fitzgerald Memorial Scholarship

KCKCC partnered with the Ella Fitzgerald Charitable Foundation to create a new music scholarship - the Ella Fitzgerald Memorial Scholarship. The scholarship will provide one music or audio engineering student per year with a full-tuition scholarship that covers all college-related fees and expenses. KCKCC's first recipient was Christian Anderson, a second-year music major from Shawnee, Kan. KCKCC was chosen as an Ella Fitzgerald Charitable Foundation partner, in part, because of the college's repeated national exposure through the Downbeat Student Music Awards and performances at various national conferences. In addition, Dr. Justin Binek, assistant professor of music at KCKCC, completed his doctoral research on Fitzgerald's improvisation techniques, and the foundation has expressed interest in partnering with a community college that had a high percentage of minority students.

Softball sweeps on the road in the Jayhawk Conference are hard to come by, and almost impossible for KCKCC at Johnson County - until April 9. It was KCKCC's first sweep of the Cavaliers in more than 25 years - since March 7, 1995.



KCKCC's "The Standard" Releases **New Music**

"The Standard" Vocal Jazz Ensemble released a new single, which is currently available on all digital platforms. "Reparations" is an original work by KCKCC Theory and Jazz Studies Professor Justin Binek, set to a poem by Kathryn Sparks. Binek is currently writing an entire song cycle on Sparks' 28poem collection "Lullabies and Nocturnes." "Reparations" is the third poem in the "Lullabies" portion of the cycle. The entire cycle is inspired by Binek's two daughters, Cora and Iris. "The Standard" premiered the piece at the 2019 Jazz Education Network National Conference in Reno, Nevada and won a DownBeat Magazine Student Music Award for Outstanding Scat Vocalist by Noah Haskin. The recording was made in KCKCC's audio engineering facility at the Dr. Thomas R. Burke Technical Education Center in May 2019.

Blue Devils Defeat Johnson County in Plains Region VI Championship, National **Tournament Bound for 3rd Time**

It was almost like Déjà vu all over again for the Lady Blue Devils of Kansas City Kansas Community College. In 2016, the Blue Devils had lost twice to unbeaten and No. 1 ranked Johnson County, the second time by 91-61. Yet 22 days later, KCKCC beat the Cavaliers 73-66 to win the Plains Region VI championship (and eventually a national championship). This season, the No. 1 ranked and unbeaten Cavaliers posted 11 and 24-point wins over KCKCC, but in epic fashion April 10, the Blue Devils grabbed the 67-59 Plains Championship at Friends University in Wichita and a shot at another national title. Unfortunately, in the first round of the national tournament, No. 14 seeded Union County, the same team KCKCC demolished in the 2019 NJCAA Division II championship game, out-played the Blue Devils' with a 72-69 overtime upset in the tournament, which was played at Catawba Valley Community College in Hickory, N.C. The loss dropped the No. 3 seeded Blue Devils (20-3) into the consolation bracket against No. 11 seeded Muskegon - a game Muskegon won 68-47.

KCKCC English Department" Releases Latest Edition of Scenic Route

The Kansas City Kansas Community College English Department published the newest issue of its literary magazine, Scenic Route, in fall 2020. Scenic Route was started in 2011 and recognizes the creative talents of KCKCC students. Published annually or every two years, it includes student poems, stories, plays and essays as well as student artwork in a variety of different mediums. Tasha Haas, associate professor of English at KCKCC, manages the magazine, while Bryan Whitehead, journalism faculty at the college, is responsible for the design. This year, a student editor assisted on the issue, Kaleb Goldbeck. Goldbeck was also the recipient of the Phillip W. Miller Memorial Creative Writing Scholarship. In 2013, the magazine was recognized as the third best regional community college literary magazine.

KCKCC's PTK Chapter Recognized for Increasing Membership in 2020

The Mu Delta Chapter of Phi Theta Kappa at Kansas City Kansas Community College was recognized as a 2021 REACH Chapter. The REACH (Recognizing Excellence in Acceptance and Completion with Honors) Awards program recognizes Phi Theta Kappa chapters that excel in membership development and recruitment campaigns. The program rewards chapters for maintaining or increasing their membership acceptance rate by 15 percent or higher during the 2020 calendar year. As part of the recognition, KCKCC received three Phi Theta Kappa graduation stoles, which can be distributed to chapter officers or members to be worn during graduation. The Mu Delta Chapter was one of only 28 in the state of Kansas to be recognized this year.

KCKCC-TEC's Culinary Arts Program Receives Outstanding Program Award from ATEA

The Kansas City Kansas Community College Culinary Arts program was honored as one of the best in the nation. The program received the 2021 Outstanding Technical Program Award from the American Technical Education Association. Several areas are considered when selecting a program to be honored including enrollment trends, career advancement and opportunities, curriculum, letters of endorsement and evidence of program excellence, among others. In addition, all nominated programs must be a college or educational institution with an active membership in the ATEA.

KCKCC-PCC Student Receives Bronze Medal in National SkillsUSA Competition

KCKCC Pioneer Career Center student, Jacob Litewski, received a bronze medal in Masonry at the SkillsUSA Nationals Competition in June. SkillsUSA is a career and technical student organization in the United States geared toward those enrolled in programs for skilled, technical and service occupations. Students, who wish to compete in SkillsUSA, can do so at the local, state and national level. The contest provides students the opportunity to compete in real world, hands-on situations. Litewski also received a gold medal in the Kansas SkillsUSA Competition in April, which allowed him to compete in the national competition.

KCKCC Debate Brings Home Top Awards from Community College National Championship, Places Second in the Country

In the past, students at Kansas City Kansas Community College have brought home one or two of the top awards at the Phi Rho Pi Community College Speech and Debate Championship. No one has ever brought home all three – until this year. KCKCC student, Nathan Newby, received the Bell Scroggins Award, given to the first-place speaker at the national tournament; the Fish-Nelson Award, given to the top speaker through a vote from his peers and the Warren-Dahlin Fellowship Award, given to the top student from Region V, at the national tournament April 4 to 10. Held virtually this year, Newby also finished second in the country in Lincoln-Douglas debate. Additionally, KCKCC Alum and Assistant Coach Alex Glanzman, received the Warren-Dahlin Fellowship Award for Coaches in Region V. Overall, KCKCC earned the Silver Medal for Sweepstakes in Debate, making the school second among all debate entries at the tournament, which is designed specifically for two-year colleges.

Blue Devils Earn At-Large Berth in National Soccer Tournament

For the first time in the nine-year history of women's soccer at KCKCC, the Blue Devils earned a spot in the NJCAA DI national tournament. Boasting their best record ever (12-2-1), the Blue Devils earned an at-large bid in the national tournament, which was played at Blanchard Woods Park in Evans, Georgia. A three-team, four-pod format, KCKCC was grouped with Eastern Florida State, the No. 3 seeded team in the tournament, and Laramie County. The Blue Devils lost both matches and did not advance in the tournament.

KCKCC's All-Kansas Golf Team Qualifies for National Tournament

Playing in the toughest NJCAA Division I golf conference has some benefits - for KCKCC, a berth in the 2021 national tournament. Six of the 20 teams in the national tournament came out of the region - Jayhawk members Hutchinson, Garden City, Dodge City and KCKCC and two Iowa powers, Indian Hills and Iowa Western. The national tournament was played on The Rawls, the home course of Texas Tech University in Lubbock, Texas, May 9 to 12. The team tied for 19th in the tournament.

Record Five KCKCC Teams, 51 Athletes All-Academic

Five teams and 51 studentathletes at KCKCC earned NJCAA academic recognition during the 2019-20 academic year. The five teams earning NJCAA Academic Team recognition were the most Blue Devil teams honored in a single season. Softball led the way with a cumulative 3.54 grade point average followed by men's golf (3.44), baseball (3.43), men's soccer (3.24) and women's soccer (3.14). Individually, 21 student-athletes were named to the NICAA All-Academic first team by compiling perfect 4.0 GPAs. In addition, 10 Blue Devils were named to the second team by earning GPAs of 3.8 to 3.99. Twenty had GPAs between 3.6 and 3.79 to earn third team honors.

Blue Devil Men No. 1 in Preseason Poll

Brandon Burgette set the bar about as high as possible in his first year as men's basketball coach at KCKCC, winning the Blue Devils' first Jayhawk Conference championship in 2020 and earning a berth in the canceled NICAA national tournament. Running off a record eight straight wins, the Blue Devils claimed the Jayhawk title with an 8-2 record and then dethroned defending champion Johnson County 75-68 to win the Region VI championship for only the second time. After starting 2-8, the Blue Devils won 16 of their last 21 games. Success did not go unnoticed as the Blue Devils were ranked No. 1 in the conference pre-season poll when it was released in January.



KCKCC Selects NISOD Excellence Award Recipients

Kansas City Kansas Community College's 2021 recipient of the annual NISOD Excellence Award was Shaun Pate, instructional designer in Online Education. NISOD's Excellence Awards recognize individuals each year who have demonstrated an outstanding commitment and contribution to their students and colleagues. In 1989, in connection with a University of Texas-Austin national study of teaching excellence, NISOD hosted its first ceremony honoring NISOD Excellence Award recipients. The response to that ceremony was so positive that NISOD began what has become the largest and most inspiring gathering that recognizes the contributions and achievements of community and technical college faculty, administrators and staff. Pate, who has been at KCKCC for eight years, was nominated by Robert Beach and Susan Stuart.

Epic Comeback Earns Bruno-Ballou 200th Win

Mary Bruno-Ballou got her 200th career volleyball win at KCKCC March 11 with a performance she will long remember. Trailing Metropolitan Community College 2-0, the Blue Devils stormed back to dominate the next three sets 25-17, 25-16, 15-11 and win No. 200 for the 10-year Blue Devil mentor. The win came on the heels of a 3-0 win over Cowley College earlier in the evening. The 200 wins are the most recorded by any Blue Devil volleyball coach.

KCKCC's Chand and Wilson Selected for Fellowship with Harvard University

Dr. Mihir Chand, Director of Institutional Effectiveness and Dr. Delfina Wilson, Vice President of Student Affairs, were accepted into Cohort 1 of the Strategic Data Project for Career and Technical Education Fellowship. The program is operated through the Center for Education Policy Research at Harvard University. The Strategic Data Project (SDP) is an initiative of the Center for Education Policy Research (CEPR) at Harvard. The primary focus of this fellowship is to significantly improve student success by directing the fellows to develop strategic policies, improve institutional abilities for quality decision making and build internal capacities to critically understand institutional characteristics and supporting evidence-based decisions. The fellows will strengthen the impact of postsecondary career and technical education programs to help students thrive in their career, workforce and life.

Athletes were allowed to practice in all sports during the fall.

KCKCC recognized its December 2020 and May 2021 graduates May 13. Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, KCKCC made the decision to host a Virtual Graduation Ceremony, which included speeches from KCKCC President Dr. Greg Mosier, Vice President of Academic Affairs Jerry Pope, Board of Trustees President Ray Daniels and Student Senate President Destin T. Williams, among others. 858 students were recognized during virtual commencement.
