KCKCC Women's Basketball Wins NJCAA National Championship Game



KCKCC has returned to the pinnacle of NJCAA DII women's basketball, winning the 2019 National Championship with an 84-59 thrashing of win over Union County, NJ.

The championship is the second for the Blue Devils, who won the 2016 national title by an average of 19 points per game. This year, the margin was nearly 18

points a game, and the final score nearly the same (KCKCC won 81-59 in 2016).

The Blue Devils led each of their first three national tourney games by 20 or more points, and the championship game was no different. Cheered on by a raucous boisterous crowd, the Blue Devils held the Owls scoreless for the first five minutes while opening a 10-0 lead. Ahead 17-10 after one quarter, the Blue Devils widened the lead to 40-22 at halftime and stretched it to 30 points in the second half. And it could have been more had they not missed shots usually made.

Nija Collier led the early surge, scoring 15 points and grabbing six rebounds on the way to being named the tournament's Most Valuable Player. Collier finished with 20 points, 12 rebounds and four assists. She was joined on the all-tournament team by the Magnolia, Ark., duo of Kisi Young and Lillie Moore. Young had 13 points and 9 rebounds; Moore 12 rebounds and 6 points. In addition, Coach Joe McKinstry was named the NJCAA National Coach of the Year.

The Blue Devils limited the Owls to 10 of 34 first half shots (,294) in building the 40-22 halftime lead and 33.8 percent for the game (27 of 80). In addition, the defense gave up just two of 19 3-point attempts (.105). KCKCC also monopolized the rebounding 52-39 including 22 off the offensive boards while shooting 40.3 percent from the field (31 of 77) and .27.6 from 3-point (8 of 29).

The championship continued the Jayhawk Conference's unparalleled success in the national tournament. In the last six seasons, the Jayhawk has had teams in the Final Four each year. In addition to KCKCC's two championships, Johnson County won in 2015

and was second in 2017; Highland was second in 2014 and third last season. This year, four conference teams finished in the Top 10 in the NJCAA national rankings.

Soto Shutout Gets Blue Devils Split at Fort Scott



KCKCC rebounded from a disappointing come-frombehind extra inning 5-4 loss with a 5-0 shutout at Fort Scott Wednesday.

Sophomore Carlos Soto of Kissimmee, Fla., turned in his best pitching performance of the season in blanking the Greyhounds in the second game.

The loss left the Blue Devils (12-2) in third place in the Jayhawk Conference standings behind Johnson County (8-0) and Cowley (7-1). Fort Scott (10-4) and Blue Devils will conclude their four-game series at KCKCC Saturday at 1 p.m.

Soto allowed just four hits, striking out seven, walking two and hitting three. The Blue Devils (23-7) backed Soto with 12 hits including a double and two singles by Griffin

Everett, three Jose Sosa singles and a Kemper Bednar double. KCKCC took a 1-0 lead in the first on singles by Traice Hartter, Kevin Santiago and Sosa's bunt single for the RBI and then added three runs in the fourth.

After singles by Sosa, Everett and Jose Acosta loaded the bases, Tyler Henry singled in one run, Matt Schrick's sacrifice fly scored a second and Bednar doubled in the third. Sosa's third hit scored the Blue Devils final run in the seventh.

The Blue Devils took a 4-3 lead in the top of the eighth in the opener on a two-out double by Eric Hinostroza after Schrick drew a walk only to have the Greyhounds score twice in the bottom of the inning off reliever Gaby Ramos. With one out, Fort Scott tied the game on a single, stolen base and single and then won it on an infield throwing error.

Orlando Ortiz pitched the first six innings, scattering nine hits while allowing three runs, one of which was unearned. He struck out seven, walked four and left nine men stranded on base. Hinostroza doubled twice and Acosta doubled and singled for four of KCKCC's six hits.

Register Now for the 2019 Blue Devil 5K & Kids Trot

A KCKCC tradition returns this spring with the 2019 Blue Devil 5K & Kids Trot.

The Blue Devil 5K, which is in its 15th year, is at 8 a.m. Saturday, May 4. The course winds through the KCKCC campus on the roads, walking paths and sidewalks. The Kids Trot follows at 9 a.m. and is geared toward children 11-years and younger. Childcare volunteers will provide activities for the children from 7:30 to 9 a.m., so parents can participate in the run/walk. Registration for the 5K is \$20 per person through March 31. The Kids Trot is \$10. Registration for both the Blue Devil 5K and the Kid's Trot includes a T-shirt, Finisher's Medal, Goodie Bag and an all-you-can eat pancake breakfast following the event. About 200 people participated in the 5K and Kids Trot in 2018.



Awards will be given to the top overall male and female finishers. In addition, the winner of each age group will receive an award and a prize. Children in the Kids Trot will run in heats based on age groups. Distances will range from 25 meters to onequarter of a mile. No strollers are allowed.

Grosstephan Pitches, Bats Blue Devils to Two One-Run Wins



A pair of outstanding pitching performances by Shay Grosstephan and Faith Maslak led KCKCC to a pair of one-run wins that went right down to the wire Wednesday.

The Blue Devils scored twice in the bottom of the seventh to rally to a 4-3 win over Southeast Community College, of Beatrice, Neb., and then stranded the tying run on third in a 2-1 second game wine.

The wins boosted the Blue Devils' record to 17-7. The Blue Devils will resume Jayhawk Conference play at Hesston Sunday at 2 and 4 p.m. They'll then play North Central Missouri in Trenton Monday and then return home against North Central on Tuesday.

Trailing 3-2 in the bottom of the seventh in the first game, Basehor-Linwood sophomore Britney Smith led off the inning with a triple and scored the game tying run on Hannah Redick's single. Inserted as a pinch runner, Turner sophomore Gracie Gentry stole second and scored the game-winner on Grosstephan's single, her fourth hit and second RBI of the game. Devin Purcell and Grosstephan each had doubles and Birttney Beck drove in the Blue Devils' other run.

Mackenzie Pinkerton started on the mound for KCKCC, allowing two runs on three hits, walking one and striking out before Grosstephan came on in relief in the third inning. She gave up three hits and an unearned run while fanning three and walking two.

Maslak, a sophomore from Raymore, Mo., allowed just four hits and had a shutout until

Southeast scored an unearned run in the top of the seventh of the second game. With the tying run on third, Grosstephan got a ground ball to second to end the game. Maslak walked one and struck out two in improving her record to 5-1.
