Special attention to problem areas of race, religion, criminal history, special needs and gang affiliations, are explored.

These include but are not limited to: lecture, multimedia, cooperative/collaborative learning, labs and demonstrations, projects and presentations, speeches, debates, panels, conferencing, performances, and learning experiences outside the classroom. Methodology will be selected to best meet student needs.

- 20. The student will be able to discuss the legal definition of Rape and sexual assault.
- 21. The student will be able to recognize and describe the symptoms of disease such as diabetes.
- 22. The student will be able to explain the effects of excess stress.
- 23. The student will be able to discuss methods to reduce stress.
- 24. The student will be able to explain the procedures for assisting a victim of sexual assault.
- 25. The student will be able to discuss how to prevent or cope with stress.
