#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Students are required to observe (on site) and participate with each of these entities: a law enforcement agency, correctional agency, police dispatch, courthouse, and probation and parole. The Program Coordinator and the agency must mutually agree to the practicum. Students will also complete online classroom instructions.

Arrangements must be made for this practicum in the semester prior to enrollment. Prerequisite: Completion of the first three semesters of the criminal justice program (45 credit hours), a C grade average or better.

#### **METHODS OF INSTRUCTION**

A variety of instructional methods may be used depending on content area. These include but are not limited to: lecture, multimedia, cooperative/collaborative learning, labs and demonstrations, projects and presentations, speeches, debates, panels, conferencing, performances, and learning experiences outside the classroom. Methodology will be selected to best meet student needs.

#### **COURSE OUTLINE**

#### **Criminal Justice Practicum**

All students will complete a 10-15-page research (term-paper), an interview with a current law enforcement officer, discussions that apply to previously learned and new concepts regarding arrest procedures, use-of-force ethics, and criminological theories, and practicum hours denoted below:

The student will complete 135 hours for 3-credit hours.

- 39 hours classroom participation (online)
- 32 hours with a law enforcement agency
- 32 hours with a correctional agency
- 24 hours with a police dispatch
- 4 hours courtroom/courthouse
- 4 hours probation and parole

## **Eligibility**

Before being eligible for a practicum assignment, as student must have a 2.0 cumulative GPA.

#### **Placement**

Practicum placement at the site of the student's preference and placement during the semester of the student's choice is not guaranteed.

a. The student will receive a list of the approved practicum sites and the name of the contact person to call and arrange to start completing their hour requirements. Students do not have to wait to complete the hours with one agency before starting

- another. For example: A student may complete 4 hours with a law enforcement agency and 4 hours in a police dispatch
- b. The contact person will inform the coordinator within 3-working days that the student has made contact and has a schedule set up with that agency.

Note: The student may reject the practicum site but recognize that placement elsewhere may not be possible for that semester.

#### **Dress Code - Business Casual**

Appropriate business casual dress includes dress slacks or khakis, collared dress shirt or blouse, collared polo shirt, optional tie or seasonal sport coat, a dress or skirt at knee-length or below, a tailored blazer, a knit shirt or sweater, and loafers or dress shoes covering all or most of the foot. \*\*\*All tops, shirts, sweaters must come up to the collar bone.

-If wearing leggings, a shirt or dress that reaches mid-thigh will be acceptable. What is Not Allowed: jeans (blue or any other color), No hooded sweatshirts, T-shirts, clothing with any writing, logo, symbol, or emblem, references to political parties, tobacco, weapons, drugs, or any offensive or controversial topics. No flip-flops, sandals, crocs, or open-toed shoes. \*\*\*If you have any questions regarding the dress code – contact the Criminal Justice Coordinator.

# **Four Core Functions (Summary)**

The student will be given four core functions to complete a 300-word summary for each entity listed in the practicum. The summaries will be submitted at the end of the term paper before the reference page.

#### **Phases of Practicum**

- a. The initial phase of the assignment must include <u>observation</u> of the agency's operations, and knowledge of guidelines, policies, philosophy, and funding sources.
- b. The second phase of the assignment is <u>participation</u>. The student must actively participate by asking questions or completing tasks assigned by the law enforcement agency, correctional facility, dispatch, courtroom, or probation and parole agency.
- c. The final phase of the practicum is the <u>evaluation</u>. The first component is the evaluation of the student by the coordinator. This evaluation consists of a contact with the site supervisor and a discussion of the student's progress. The second component is the student's report (outline follows) to be evaluated by the coordinator. The third component is the <u>300-word summary</u>. Each student will summarize the six core functions of each entity in practicum (law enforcement, corrections, courts, dispatch, and probation/parole).

#### Research paper overview:

The research paper will be APA style, 10-15 pages in length plus a title and reference pages (not included in the page count), double spaced, Times New Roman 12 pt. font, and have a minimum of five references (three references are peer-reviewed) denoted in APA on the reference page.

# III. Conduct a phone or zoom interview an officer or deputy at the agency who has the rank of Sergeant or above and address elements (a through g) in the interview – then write a summary of the interview. (2-pages)

- b. How many years on the force?
- c. What other duties has this officer or deputy performed throughout their career?
- d. Where did he or she attend the police academy?
- e. What are the main crimes officers or deputies deal within their agency?
- f. Discuss three challenges faced by this agency
- g. Identify three positive things this agency is doing for their community

#### Withdrawal from/Termination of Practicum

- a. A student may withdrawal from the practicum for personal reasons following the college timetable for withdraw. The student may re-enroll in the following semester but may not apply the practicum hours already completed to the re-enrollment.
- b. Student's will be considered non-paid professional staff of the agency/facility and therefore must comply with all agency/facility rules and regulations. Failure to do so may result in the immediate termination of the practicum will be denied for one academic year. Example, termination of practicum during Spring semester will result in denied re-enrollment until the following Spring semester).
- c. The site supervisor may terminate the practicum assignment without prior notice if it is his/her professional judgment that any student is jeopardizing the safety or welfare of the agency or facility. The site supervisor must apply the coordinator of the Criminal Justice Program with a written account of the cause of termination within one week of the termination.

The student may request to enroll after one academic year, but placement is not guaranteed.

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will:

- 1. Explain the functions of each entity listed in the practicum and how all these work both together and independently of each other.
- 2. Summarize four core of each entity in the practicum.
- 3. Describe the main court cases and the first 14 amendments in the Bill of Rights.
- 4. Explain theses concepts as it relates to law enforcement: force continuum, the basis of the concept "fruit of the poisonous tree," and the exclusionary rule
- 5. The student will be able to relate objectives 1-4 above to material covered in their Criminal Justice education courses.
