COURSE DESCRIPTION

Infant/Toddler I begins the introduction of developmental theories and milestones of children aged 0 to 3 within the context of cultural, linguistic, and abilities diversity. Sensitivity to attachment and the importance of observation and communication skills to nurture positive family, caregiver, and child relationships through the roles of primary caregiving, transitions, and continuity of care will be highlighted as students learn to design responsive programs for infants and toddlers and their families. The course requires a minimum of 15 hours in primary settings with NAEYC accreditation, or licensed early childhood programs for family, group, center, Head Start, faith-based, pre-k or nursery school setting must be approved by coordinator.
