### **METHODS OF INSTRUCTION**

A variety of instructional methods may be used depending on content area. These include but are not limited to, lecture, multimedia, cooperative/collaborative learning, labs and demonstrations, projects and presentations, speeches, debates, panels, conferencing, performances, and learning experiences outside the classroom. Methodology will be selected to best meet student needs.

## **COURSE OUTLINE**

- I. Pairs of students involved in a signed conversation-reviewing vocabulary from Basic Sign Language.
- II. Introduce finger spelling of words with 4 characters.
- III. Group activity to simulate signed conversations for expressive and receptive practice.
- IV. Lecture of the Time Line in American Sign Language
- V. Expressive story signed by instructor to enhance receptive skills.
- VI. Lecture of Classifiers: what are they and how they are used in ASL
- VII. Use classifiers to describe a still picture
- VIII. Lecture: Defining the subject or object in ASL grammar
- IX. Expressive stories signed by students to incorporate classifiers
- X. Lecture: Locators and Plurals in ASL
- XI. Learning to apply facial grammar to change meaning of a signed word
- XII. Lecture: Temporal Aspect
- XIII. Expressive stories signed by students to incorporate facial grammar and locators
- XIV. Lecture: The Deaf Community and its culture
- XV. Introduce finger-spelling of words with up to 8 characters
- XVI. Expressive stories signed by students to incorporate finger-spelling
- XVII. Lecture: Devices for the Deaf i.e., TDD and proper telephone etiquette.
- XVIII. Lecture: Etiology of deafness/the ear
- XIX. Expressive stories signed by students and video taped for self-critique
- XX. American Sign Language Idioms

- 11. The student will be able to prepare a signed story and choose appropriate classifiers.
- 12. The student will be able to select locators that give appropriate meaning to classifiers.
- 13. The student will be able to analyze facial grammar as it relates to various meanings of one sign.
- 14. The student will be able to distinguish a singular sign from a plural sign in ASL.
- 15. The student will be able to access the meaning of a sign after temporal aspect has been applied.

C. CLO #3 The student will be able to comprehend and answer questions about various stories told through sign language.

- 16. The student will be able to prepare a signed story and choose appropriate classifications.
- 17. The student will be able to select locators that give appropriate meaning to classifiers.
