- 4. The student will perform reading simple meter rhythm exercises by counting, clapping and tapping.
- 5. The student will perform reading simple meter with beat division rhythm exercises by counting, clapping and tapping.
- 6. The student will construct on manuscript simple rhythms and short step-wise melodies by the process of dictation.

The student will be able to demonstrate knowledge of all major and minor keys.

- 7. The student will be able to construct the circle of fifths for major and minor keys.
- The student will be able to identify and construct key signatures, major and minor keys.
- 9. The student will be able to identify, construct and perform on keyboard all minor keys, all forms.
- 10. The student will be able to identify, construct and perform on keyboard relative and parallel minor keys.
- 11. The student will be able to identify, construct all the church modes.

The student will be able to demonstrate knowledge of intervals on manuscript and keyboard.

- 12. The student will be able to identify, construct on manuscript, and perform on keyboard all Major intervals.
- 13. The student will be able to identify, construct on manuscript, and perform on keyboard all Minor intervals.
- 14. The student will be able to identify, construct on manuscript, and perform on keyboard all Diminished intervals.
- 15. The student will be able to identify, construct on manuscript, and perform on keyboard all Augmented intervals.
- 16. The student will be able to identify, construct on manuscript, simple and compound intervals.
- 17. The student will be able to demonstrate by keyboard performance and writing with manuscript interval inversions.

The student will be able to demonstrate the knowledge of compound meter, solfeggio, and dictation.

- 18. The student will perform reading simple compound rhythm exercises by counting, clapping and tapping.
- 19. The student will perform reading dotted note rhythm exercises by counting, clapping and tapping.
- 20. The student will perform singing solfeggio in Major keys
- 21. The student will perform reading triplet note rhythm exercises by counting, clapping and tapping.

The student will be able to demonstrate the knowledge of chords

- 22. The student will demonstrate knowledge of Major, Minor, Diminished, Augmented triads by performing on keyboard and constructing on manuscript.
- 23. The student will identify and construct on manuscript chord name and symbols.
- 24. The student will identify, construct on manuscript and perform on keyboard triad root position and inversions.
- 25. The student will identity, construct on manuscript and perform on keyboard all seventh chords and their inversions.
