# Kansas City Kansas Community College Minutes of the Board of Trustees Meeting February 19, 2019

#### CONSENT AGENDA - A Meeting Minutes

#### Upper Jewell

- 1) **Call to Order and Pledge of Allegiance**: The February meeting of the Board of Trustees was called to order by Chair, Rosalyn Brown. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Trustee, Tyrone Garner.
- 2) **Roll Call:** Indicated the following present Trustees: Donald Ash, Rosalyn Brown, Ray Daniels, Tyrone Garner, Janice McIntyre, and Linda H. Sutton. Trustee Criswell attended via conference call.
- 3) Approval of Agenda: Chair Brown called for approval of the Amended Agenda that indicated the correction to the Human Resources Personnel Items list, correction to Dr. Mosier's report and the inclusion of the De Lage Landen Contract for language clarification. Trustee McIntyre moved to approve the Amended Agenda and Trustee Daniels seconded. The <u>Motion Carried</u>.
- 4) Audience to Patrons and Petitioners: There was no one wishing to address the Board.

#### 5) **Recognitions/Presentations:**

- Ms. Pam Louis-Walden addressed the Board to present several plaques and recognize Dr. Ewa Unoke, Associate Professor of Political Science for establishing the Freedom High School in Liberia, Africa in 2011, the Ntsokara High School in 2017, and the Virginia Community College scheduled to open in Liberia in October, 2019. Ms. Louis-Walden asked approval to include the KCKCC logo on two of the flags that will fly over the schools in Africa as well as one for KCKCC. Dr. Unoke thanked The Board of Trustees for giving him the opportunity to work at KCKCC as well as his appreciation for everyone's support.
- Dr. Shawn Derritt, Dean of Student Services, presented an overview of his dissertation. His dissertation comprised of data, specifically on men of color, and what affects their quality of education. Dr. Derritt spoke of the significant findings that mandatory advising has on the retention and persistence of all students as well as the impact on African American and Latinix students. Dr. Derritt spoke of the reason for his dissertation topic which was to study the reason for the disproportionate completion rates that students of color have at community colleges. Community College students who received mandatory advising will be retained at a higher rate. Dr. Derritt stated that more data is needed regarding the impact that academic advising has on the retention and persistence of students of color.

#### 6) Board Committee Reports:

• Trustee Janice McIntyre gave an update on Community Engagement and noted that the information given to the Trustees was still in draft stage. Trustee McIntyre stated that the Community Engagement

Board will interface with the Board every quarter. Their purpose is to show more transparency in communication with the Wyandotte-Leavenworth community.

- Trustee Ray Daniels reported on the Policy Committee and stated that there are currently six policies ready to go forward and should be ready for final Board approval in the next few months.
- Trustee Tyrone Garner reported on the Finance Committee Meeting of February 12. Trustee Garner reported that the College is in good financial standing and that it is operating within or under budget. Trustee Garner stated that he felt good about the budgetary outlook
- Trustee Don Ash reported on the recent ACCT Legislative Summit which took place in Washington, D.C., February 10-13, 2019. Trustee Ash stated, "We conquered and returned." Trustee Ash also stated that they look forward to hearing from student attendee, and Student Ambassador to the February 10-13 ACCT Summit, Manny Paredes. Trustee Ash reminded everyone that the Phi Theta Kappa Recognition Luncheon will take place in Topeka, KS on March 7<sup>th</sup> and will be in conjunction with the KACCT/COP Quarterly Meeting.
- 7) **Consent Agenda:** Chair Brown called for approval of the Consent Agenda. Trustee McIntyre moved to approve and Trustee Criswell seconded. Trustee Sutton interjected that her question, at the January meeting regarding the hiring of Mike Brunner, had not been answered. Trustee Sutton questioned whether he was being hired as a part-time or full-time employee and if part-time why the H.R. list indicated a salary instead of hourly pay. H.R. Officer, Ms. Christina McGee, stated that it was an over sight in responding and that, yes, Mike Brunner was hired as a part-time employee and that he is being paid as an hourly employee. Trustee Sutton asked that approval of Item D, the Personnel Items, be held until after Executive Session. Trustee Sutton moved to approve the Consent Agenda for <u>only</u> items A, B, and C. Trustee McIntyre seconded and the <u>Motion Carried</u>.
- 8) **Student Senate Report –** President Aliyah Shaw reported on the following:
  - Women's and men's basketball game vs. JCCC, Saturday, February 23, as well as the men's basketball game. Game times are 2:00 & 4:00 p.m.
  - Grocery Bingo has been rescheduled for February 27<sup>th</sup>.
  - President Shaw reported that most student activities currently take place through the clubs and organizations and not as much through Student Senate.
  - The Intercultural Center is presenting many great Black History events.
  - Many of the clubs are learning about Professor Dr. Ewa Unoke's Global Peace model of the UN which focuses on transitional justice.
  - March 1-3, 2019, the KCKCC Dems will travel to Topeka
  - Next Student Senate meeting is February 27, 2019.
  - Now have spring calendar for Main Campus, TEC and PCC activities.

Hearing no further questions or comments, Chair Brown called for a motion to accept the report. Trustee Criswell moved and Trustee McIntyre seconded. The <u>Motion Carried</u>.

## 9) **President's Report:** Dr. Mosier reported on the following:

- Recognized Dr. Ewa Unoke and Dr. Shawn Derritt for their achievements.
- Wyandotte County, "Who's Who Gala" is March 30, 2019. Mr. Roger Suggs will be one of the recipients to be honored.
- Introduced Mr. Rusty McClouth, new Director of Institutional Effectiveness. Before coming to KCKCC, Mr. McClouth was the senior research analyst at Metropolitan Community College.
- KCKCC has a new partnership with Amazon via the work of Tami Bartunek and Dr. Ed Kremer. The partnership will give Amazon employees an opportunity to obtain a two-year certificate which will be paid for by Amazon. Several KCKCC programs will be made available to the Amazon employees, and classes will begin in the fall of 2019.
- This Thursday, three student interns will tour as part of the NUCA (National Utility Contractors Association) program. Internship often turns into permanent employment which is a great opportunity for these students.
- KCKCC has a partnership with the Kansas City T-Bones Baseball Team for Sunday–Thursday night games in the spring. Entry is free for KCKCC employees showing their College identification.
- Met with the Child Care Center Committee regarding the RFP (Request for Purchase) which will then be released for vendors to submit bids for partnership. Trustee Criswell asked how long the window for the RFP will be open with the response that bids will close March 25.

Hearing no further questions or comments, Chair Brown called for a motion to accept the President's Report. Trustee Daniels moved and Trustee McIntyre seconded. The <u>Motion Carried</u>.

## 10) **Community Outreach and Marketing Report:** Tami Bartunek reported on the following:

- Have had 98,600 twitter followers. "Social media is moving up."
- The launch of The Blue Devil Impact, featuring business partners, alumni and students and the impact they have on KCKCC, is March 1<sup>st</sup>.
- The Foundation has a new board member, Pattie Whitmer, from JE Dunn.
- Fundraising continues for the Hall of Fame, April 27<sup>th</sup> at TEC. The goal is \$150,000.

Hearing no further questions or comments, Chair Brown called for a motion to accept the Community Outreach and Marketing Report. Trustee Criswell moved and Trustee McIntyre seconded. The <u>Motion</u> <u>Carried.</u>

- 11) Vice-President for Academic Affairs: Dr. Beth Ann Krueger reported on the following:
  - Explained the Course Fees for FY 2020 and indicated that the fees had gone through the Finance Committee for review. Dr. Krueger explained the Course Fees have stayed the same and that there is no net increase. Dr. Krueger stated that the Blue Curriculum was being phased out. Trustee Daniels moved to approve the FY 2020 Course Fees and Trustee Garner seconded. The <u>Motion Carried</u>.

- Dr. Krueger gave an overview and highlighted Division, Faculty, and student accomplishments and achievements from her report. Hearing no further questions or comments, Chair Brown called for a motion to accept the VP-AA report. Trustee McIntyre moved and Trustee Sutton seconded. The <u>Motion</u> <u>Carried</u>.
- 12) Vice-President of Student Affairs: Dr. Delfi Wilson reported on the following:
  - Roger Suggs will be recognized at the Wyandotte County 2019 Who's Who Gala. Dr. Wilson also recognized the student athletes for their academic achievements. Dr. Wilson stated that the overall GPA for the student athletes was a 3.06 and 59% of the student athletes finished with a 3.0 or higher. Twenty-six athletes earned a 4.0.
  - Attended the USD Honeywell Opportunity for Prosperity through Education Scholarship Event (HOPE), at KCKPS with Dr. Beth Ann Krueger. The HOPE Scholarship is designed to put high school students on the pathway to modern manufacturing jobs.
  - Dr. Wilson continued in her review of recent data, activities, and achievements in the Student Affairs Division.

Hearing no further questions or comments, Chair Brown called for a motion to accept the report. Trustee Criswell moved and Trustee McIntyre seconded. The <u>Motion Carried</u>.

- 13) Chief Information Officer Report: Peter Gabriel reported on the following: In Peter Gabriel's absence, Chair Brown called for a motion to accept his written report. Trustee McIntyre moved and Trustee Sutton seconded. The <u>Motion Carried</u>.
- 14) Human Resources Report: Christina McGee reported on the following:

• Human Resources has reconvened to review options regarding employee Health and Benefits. Hearing no further questions or comments, Chair Brown called for a motion to accept the report. Trustee Sutton moved and Trustee McIntyre seconded. The <u>Motion Carried</u>.

- 15) **Finance & Administrative Services Report –** Mr. Mike Beach reported on the following:
  - In Mike Beach's absence, Dr. Mosier reported that "all is well with the institution."
  - Property tax revenue increased 20 mil, which is 3% higher than expected, considering services to Leavenworth. The College has been efficient with fiscal resources and has only spent 50% of the annual budget funds in Capital Reserve.
  - There has been no discussion of removal of the old marquees.
  - Trustee Garner spoke of the Summer Program and stated that he had been in discussion with Dr. Marisa Gray, Executive Director of Continuing Education, and that they were looking at expenses and how, as an institution, we could offset expenses. Dr. Mosier stated that he had a discussion with Dr. Foust, Superintendent of KCKPS, on how the Kansas City public schools can help. Trustee Garner stated that he will bring options to the next Finance Committee meeting as to how to keep the program going.

Hearing no further questions or comments, Chair Brown called for a motion to accept his report. Trustee McIntyre moved and Trustee Sutton seconded. The <u>Motion Carried</u>.

#### 16) Unfinished Business:

Trustee Garner stated he appreciated the DeLage Landen/Cisco Contract being included in the February Board of Trustees packet. The clarification of the contract language, indicating the non-discrimination clause, had been previously discussed but warranted confirmation.

#### 17) New Business:

Dr. Mosier read a Resolution for the serving of alcoholic liquor at the February 21, 2019 Art Gallery Reception from 4:00-6:30 PM in the Art Gallery and area just outside the deli area. Chair Brown called for a motion to approve the Resolution. Trustee Sutton moved and Trustee McIntyre seconded. The <u>Motion Carried</u>.

#### 18) **Executive Session**:

Chair Brown called for a motion to enter into Executive Session. Attorney Greg Goheen suggested that a time of 20 minutes would be needed and there would be action to follow. # *Night-time Programs, Customized Training, Apprenticeships, Continuing Education – Director, Mr. Rich Piper*

On March 7, Mr. Piper was the featured presenter for a WYEDC (Wyandotte Economic Development Council) Roundtable focused on Advanced Manufacturing short term and long term solutions for the significant shortage of AMTs in the Wyandotte County and KC Metro Area. Kansas Department of Kansas, 11 Kansas businesses, KCKPS, MAMTC and other interested parties attended. 28 individuals attended this meeting.

On March 7<sup>th</sup>, the college graduated its fourth (4<sup>th</sup>) Cohort of Preventative Maintenance Inspection (PMI) students. This program is a partnership between KCKCC, Ms. Shannon Martinez of the Department of Commerce, and Mr. Lars Leninger of Workforce Partnership. We are working on launching a 5<sup>th</sup> cohort of PMI training students. PMI is an engine and machine maintenance (upkeep and repair) program.

Many of these students utilize this program to promote at their company to a maintenance personnel. The certification can also jumpstart them on a diesel mechanic pathway.

Below are some of the pictures from the PMI (Preventative Maintenance Inspection) graduation ceremony held on March 7<sup>th</sup> at the TEC building.



The night programs at TEC are into their second semester of mentorship and educational training. These sessions were started to help industry professionals adjust to the facets of the education world. Topics explored are: teaching strategies, classroom management, learning styles, navigating WebAdvisor and Blackboard; to name a few. Due to a high turn-over rate of night-time adjuncts, Director Rich Piper and Dean Runnebaum, felt it would be beneficial to host mentoring sessions every other week to provide more supports to these instructors and bridge the day-time and night-time programs together. This month the program topic of exploration included outside training outlets for students to explore various industry pathways options; training students on how to network with employers. These sessions help bridge the gap for instructors coming from industry to teaching.

Apprenticeship program – Paul Hancock, Apprenticeship and Employment Coordinator, and Dean Runnebaum visited with the Executive Director of the Peaslee Center to get some quality examples of apprenticeship programs developed by that Center.

#### Entrepreneurship, Workforce & Career Center - Director: Dr. Alicia Hooks

Entrepreneurship, Workforce and Career Center staff gave a presentation entitled "Innovate, Integrate, Motivate Your Classroom" at the KCPT (TV Channel 19) K-12 Technology Conference on February 28<sup>th</sup> at the Kauffman Foundation Conference Center. "Because We Care" program at KUMed (University of Kansas Medical Center) celebrated their second month of class. The "Because We Care" program is a partnership between KCKCC and KUMed to work with employees who do not have their GED, to obtain their GED while working and going to KCKCC. The program will add a second class in April for the KUHS night shift. Darlene Franklin, current GED student, served as the Ambassador speaking to the KUHS mentors (what is the role of the mentors?)

Mr. Brian Patrick, Director of Cultural Outreach, coordinated the start of four non-credit classes in February: two GED in Spanish classes, Principles of Real Estate, and Pharmacy Technician.

Mr. Patrick also attended the KCKCC information meetings held at El Centro, on Feb. Thursday, Feb. 21<sup>st</sup> and Monday, Feb. 25<sup>th</sup>, to gather community feedback about KCKCC classes at Wyandotte High School.

Ms. Stephanie Marquez, Adjunct Instructor provided Spanish Language Proficiency Assessments for Unified Government employees. One of these assessments was for the Delinquent Real Estate Department, this is the first time we have worked with this department.

#### Health Professions - Dean Dr. Tiffany Bohm

Remodeling for the Fire Science learning spaces is progressing with all facilities now being functional. The Fire Science faculty and staff are excited to welcome the HLC team on April 18 for the multi-location site visit.

The ADN program is looking forward to their next consultation session with Donna Ignativicius on March 25-26. They have built and received approval for the new curriculum they developed with her guidance and are now working on development of course outlines and materials that are evidence-based.

Frankie Davis, nursing faculty, was one of two recipients to receive the 2019 Louisa Fletcher Excellence in Education Award from the NAACP Bonner Springs Education Committee.

On March 12 the Kansas State Board of Nursing reapproved the Associate Degree Nursing program following a focused visit for declining pass rates. Because the 2018 pass rate was raised to above the required 75% threshold, this was full approval with no conditions.

Dr. Bohm served as the team leader for a Commission on Accreditation in Physical Therapy Education (CAPTE) site-visit for determining initial accreditation at a new PTA program. This took place March 2-6.

Deanne Yates, PTA faculty, was in Alexandria, Virginia from March 7-10 to review, revise and develop questions for the National Physical Therapy Exam (NPTE) for the PTA. Mrs. Yates is serving a three-year term on the Exam Design Committee (EDC).

Deanne Yates, PTA faculty, is the slated candidate for her third and final term as Physical Therapy Association Caucus representative for the Kansas Physical Therapy Association (KPTA). Election results will be announced at the KPTA's Spring meeting.

Michele Avery, PTA program coordinator, attended the Midwest Consortium meetings for Directors of PTA Clinical Education in St. Louis March 7-9. While there, a celebration was held to honor the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the PTA profession.

The Health Professions Division (HP) is running a service project called Noah's Bandage Project. Noah was a child from Kansas Center who valiantly fought Ewing's Sarcoma to a cure. Unfortunately, less than a month after being placed in remission, he was diagnosed with Acute Myeboid Leukemia and lost that battle a few short days later in July 2015. While in the hospital, Noah received a plain brown bandage after one of his many needle sticks. He decided that instead of a plain bandage, every child should get a cool, fun bandage after a procedure to signal the end of the pain. Thus, he started collecting cool, fun bandages to donate to Children's Mercy. When Noah lost his battle, his parents decided to carry on his legacy and started Noah's Bandage Project as a 501c3 organization. To date they have donated over 5.5 million bandages and \$600,000 to pediatric cancer research!

At KCKCC, the Health Professions Division is running the project from March 12 to April 12. The Deans' Council wanted to support this project and many of them have volunteered to have bandage collection boxes placed in their areas. 2019-2020 Processing Begins

- The set-up has been completed for 2019-2020 and the first batch of FAFSA applications has been received for Fall 2019. Letters have been sent to students regarding the status of their 2019-2020 federal financial aid. Below is a three-year comparison of the applications received at this time of the year.
- The Admissions Office is contacting students who have sent FAFSA information to KCKCC but have not applied for admission to the college.

KCKCC Loan Default Draft Rate

- The US. Department of Education has released a draft of the 2016 three-year cohort default rate for Kansas City Kansas Community College. The default rate is **8.1**% based on 1112 students going into repayment with 91 of these students going into default.
- This rate is below our 2015 three-year rate of 9.6%.

Financial Literacy Program At KCKCC

• For the past few years KCKCC entered a contract with American Student Assistance to offer the financial literacy program \$ALT to KCKCC students. As of December 31, 2018, \$ALT will no longer be available.

• Federal regulations mandate that the college have in place a financial literacy program for its students. The Student Financial Aid Office has researched serval options and has scheduled several presentations regarding financial literacy programs that are available and used by other colleges. The follow programs are under review:

- Which Way sponsored by Borrower Connect
- o **iGrad**
- Cash Course sponsored by the National Endowment for Financial Education
- My College Money Plan Financial Literacy Project funded by a Department of Education College Access Challenge Grant
- Money Smart sponsored by FDIC- Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation
- Select KCKCC staff, faculty and the Student Senate President has reviewed demonstrations of each program. The success of using any of these programs depends on the buy-in of faculty and staff who will incorporate the financial literacy tools that will be provided into their course content.






